

OPERATION SHUJAA: VICTORIES AGAINST ATROCITIES AND TOP ADF COMMANDERS IN EASTERN DRC AND UGANDA.

ince the joint military operations begun : were scattered all over the jungles in Eastern on 30th November, 2021 in Eastern DR Congo a number of achievements have been registered despite some wrong elements carrying out atrocities on innocent civilians both in eastern Congo and Uganda. We take you through some of the Operation Shujaa success stories that include the top ADF commanders killed in the battle of Mwarika and Djerube-Lusulubi in the Rwenzori sector. The joint operation in DRC against ADF, have yielded results that are self-evident. According to Brig. Stephano Mugerwa, Deputy Commander Mountain Division and other security sources, many of the ADF camps that

DRC are now destroyed. Reports indicate that the remaining ADF combatants and their families are on the run. The joint forces killed top ADF commanders and many rebels and a number of ammunitions, communication gadgets, have been recovered.

Hassan Rubazana Elias Ssegujja. According to Colonel Mak Hazukay, the spokesperson for Operation Shuja, Ssegujja, also known as Fezza, Feeza and Mulalo was killed during clashes in Mwalika valley in the Rwenzori sector in North Kivu.

TOURISTS KILLED IN UGANDA: CAPTURED ADF LEADER ALSO ACCUSED OF SCHOOL MASSACRE



A Briton and a South African were murdered

along with their guide in an attack on October 17 while on safari in Queen Elizabeth National Park. Uganda blamed the ADF, an armed militia based in the neighbouring Democratic Republic of Congo that is affiliated with the Islamic State (IS) group.

Ugandan military captured Abdul Rashid Kyoto, an ADF militia commander, accused of murdering two foreign tourists in Queen Elizabeth Park. Kyoto faces additional charges for a June school massacre in Mpondwe, linked to ADF. Affiliated with ISIS, ADF was implicated in attacks in DRC and Uganda, causing concern in the tourism sector.

General Dick Olum, leading an anti-ADF operation, asserted Kyoto's involvement in the attacks. The arrest is a reassurance to Ugandans and tourists that Uganda is a safe

country and is committed to combating all those that want to interfere with the country's peace. seven individuals, including a 75-year-old, for ADF links, terrorism, child trafficking, and rape were sentenced signaling a crackdown on the extremist group.

TRAGEDY AS ADF KILLS 41 STUDENTS IN KASESE DISTRICT

On 16th June 2023, Ugandans woke up to the news of the tragic death of 37 students who had been shot dead, others hacked by Machetes, and some burnt while alive in their dormitories at Lhubirira secondary school in Nyabugando Town Council in Kasese District by ADF rebels, the other students who had sustained fatal injuries later succumbed to injuries taking the toll to 41 students.

Ugandans must unite against the menace of ADF to eradicate this threat. Together, we can honor the memories of the innocent lives lost and strive for a safer, more secure future for our children and for everyone.



FRENCH COURT THROWS OUT CASE AGAINST EACOP

A French court rejected a case brought by six NGOs against TotalEnergies over the East African Oil project in Uganda and Tanzania. The NGOs filed the case in 2019, accusing TotalEnergies of insufficiently protecting people and the environment in the Tilenga oil development and the \$3.5 billion East African Crude Oil Pipeline.

The activists sought to stop the projects, citing a 2017 French law requiring companies to address human rights and environmental risks in their global operations. However, the court ruled that the NGOs did not follow the correct procedures. President Museveni reassured that the project would proceed as agreed.

Significant strides have been made on the project. On January 24, 2023, the East African Crude Oil Pipeline Company (EACOP) Ltd obtained a construction license for the East African Crude Oil Pipeline. This license empowered the company to initiate the development of the 1,443km, 24-inch diameter heated and buried crude oil pipeline

THE FIGHT AGAINST CORRUPTION IN 2023



In the execution of the President's directive and the unwavering commitment to combat corruption, the year 2023 witnessed numerous individuals being held accountable for offenses such as the misuse of public funds, bribery, and misappropriation of funds. The Internal Security Organization, in collaboration with the

State House Anti-Corruption Unit, remains steadfast in leading the charge against corruption—an overarching priority for the NRM Government.

The fight has led to recovery of millions of money and many offenders have been arrested and are paying for their corruption crimes. In a report produced by Inspectorate of Government, it was reported that the Total Value of the cases investigated was UGX: 507 Billion. Funds recovered and deposited on IG Asset Recovery Account UGX: 3,631,442,057 as of July 2023.

In addition as of June 2023, 295 Corruption cases had been investigated and completed.



POLICE ARRESTS TWO SUSPECTS OVER THEFT OF GOVERNMENT DRUGS

n Rukungiri District, two medical workers were arrested in January, 2023 in connection with the theft and sale of Government drugs in private clinics. The operation was carried out by the Deputy Resident District Commissioner (DRDC), Ahimbisibwe Wilberforce Ongom. The suspects were netted from private clinics, one in Rusheshe trading center and another one in Omukarangara belonging to Dr. Julius Tukamusiima, a health worker at Bugangari Health Center (IV).





ENTEBBE AIRPORT **CORRUPTION SCANDAL**

n mid-January, social media platforms in Uganda were flooded with videos depicting travelers at Entebbe International Airport expressing grievances about instances of extortion and unauthorized payments by airport staff. In response to the public outcry, the Uganda Civil Aviation Authority (UCAA) took immediate action, suspending several employees pending a thorough investigation into the allegations. Uganda is dedicated to combating all forms of corruption.

FORUM FOR **DEMOCRATIC CHANGE** SPLITS INTO TWO **FACTIONS**

The gathering of NRM Mps with the Speakers was looked at as an endorsement of the Muhoozi project by many political analysts and members of the public. The conversation made news around the country on all media platforms and outlets.

FROM DEBATES TO DECISIONS: A YEAR IN PARLIAMENT'S SPOTLIGHT

January 23, 2023. A decisive vote of 356 was in the vibrant August house. While not all bills cast, with a striking 348 in favor of censuring the minister, while five MPs opposed, and three chose to abstain.

Opposition MP's Boycott Parliamentary sitting over human rights abuse

On October 10th, 2023, Opposition Members of Parliament (MPs) staged a walkout from a plenary sitting in Parliament to express their opposition to the ongoing arrest, abduction, and detention of their leaders and supporters. They condemned the behaviour of the security forces, stating that it contradicts the principles of Uganda's independence, which was celebrated in the same month.

Opposition MPs have maintained their boycott of Parliament since November 6, using their absence to press the government to address issues related to abductions and the 18 missing persons.

UGANDA ATTRACTS RECORD FOREIGN DIRECT INVESTMENT, **BOOSTING ECONOMIC** GROWTH.

Tganda has experienced a significant surge in foreign direct investment (FDI), propelling significant economic growth. The country's FDI has surged by UGX 1.55 trillion, reaching an unprecedented UGX 5.5 trillion between 2021 and 2023, marking a record high. This notable increase in Uganda's FDI has been highlighted by the United Nations Conference on Trade and Development (UNCTAD) as the most substantial in East Africa.

The increase in FDI is attributed to substantial investments in the development of the Lake Albertine oil field, a strategic joint venture between the China National Offshore Oil Company (CNOOC) and the Uganda National Oil Company (UNOC). The estimated investment for this venture is UGX 23.7 trillion (\$6.5 billion), further solidifying Uganda's position as an attractive destination for foreign investment.





IN BUSINESS: AIRTEL UGANDA ANNOUNCES IPO

Airtel Uganda has achieved a robust 54.45% subscription rate for its initial public offering (IPO), which included 800 billion Ugandan shillings (\$213 million) worth of shares. The

IPO commenced on August 29, with the share price set at 100 Ugandan shillings, representing a 20% stake in the company. The response was significant, as potential investors expressed interest in acquiring 4.36 billion shares out of the total 8 billion shares offered, resulting in a substantial fund-raising amount of 211.43 billion shillings.

UGANDA AIRLINES LAUNCHES DIRECT ENTEBBE-MUMBAI FLIGHTS

ganda Airlines marked a significant milestone on October 7, 2023 with the launch of its new direct service, establishing a seamless air link between Mumbai Chhatrapati Shivaji

Maharaj International Airport and Entebbe International Airport in Uganda.

This groundbreaking initiative marks the first time in over 50 years that India and Uganda are directly connected by a non-stop air service, reflecting a momentous development in bilateral ties and air travel connectivity between the two nations.

With an estimated population of approximately 35,000 Indians currently residing in Uganda, the majority of whom hold Indian passports, this direct flight service is poised to play a pivotal role in fostering stronger cultural, economic, and social ties between the two vibrant communities. The direct connection is anticipated to enhance travel convenience and efficiency, facilitating increased business, tourism, and family visits.

Uganda Airlines' commitment to providing this direct link highlights its dedication to expanding connectivity options and promoting international collaboration. The newly established route is expected to open up new opportunities for trade, tourism, and people-to-people interactions, nurturing a closer relationship between Uganda and India. As Uganda and India start on this historic journey of direct air connectivity, the launch of the Entebbe-Mumbai flights symbolizes a new era of collaboration, mutual understanding, and strengthened diplomatic and economic relations.

CAPITAL CHICKEN PONZI SCHEME UNRAVELS: UGANDANS FACE LOSSES EXCEEDING SHS 2 BILLION

Ugandans are still recovering from the fallout of the Capital Chicken Ponzi scheme, where more than 80 victims had collectively lost over Shs 2 billion. The fraudulent operation, which had promised a monthly profit of 15% for investments in the chicken business, had attracted investors over its nearly three-year existence. Notable individuals, including a retired security officer and civil servant, had invested substantial amounts, with one complainant losing Shs 420 million.

The scheme's office, situated along Kanjokya street in Kampala Central Division, abruptly closed in September, 2023, leaving clients in shock. The police had received over 80 complaints, recording losses exceeding initial estimates. Deputy Kampala Metropolitan Police Spokesperson Luke Owoyesigyire had identified key suspects as Pius Wamanga and Ernest Sempebwa, who were believed to have fled the country. Some employees had also discovered the offices closed unexpectedly.

This incident followed a similar pattern seen in the previous year's BLQ online gaming Ponzi scheme, where over Shs 2 billion had been lost. Despite these setbacks, authorities remain focused on bringing the perpetrators to justice and preventing further financial scams.

ENTEBBE AIRPORT **REBOUNDS: PASSENGER TRAFFIC** SURPASSES 1.5 **MILLION**

In a positive sign of recovery from the pandemic's impact, Entebbe International Airport witnessed an increase in passenger traffic, reaching 1.57 million in May 2023. The first quarter alone recorded 402.314 passengers, showcasing a resilient bounce back.

"In 2022, the airport registered 1.57 million passengers," said Uganda Civil Aviation Authority's (UCAA) spokesperson, Vianney Luggya.

While Entebbe handled 118,000 international passengers in 1991 at Uganda Civil Aviation Authority's (UCAA) establishment, the Airport handled 1.8 million passengers in 2019 before the outbreak of the COVID-19 pandemic.

Looking ahead to 2024, the positive momentum is expected to continue for Entebbe International Airport, as it gears up to not only reclaim but potentially surpass pre-pandemic passenger volumes. This anticipation is boosted by the upcoming hosting of significant events, including the 19th Non-Aligned Movement and the Third South Summit + China scheduled for January, 2024, which are poised to further boost passenger traffic.

it was unlawful for members of parliament to lift the age limit cap for presidential candidacy, a cap that had previously been set at the age of 75, the highest office in the country.

KEITH MUHAKANIZI

eith Muhakanizi, the former Permanent Secretary of the Ministry of Finance and Secretary to the Treasury (PSST), passed away on April 13 in a Milan, Italy hospital after a prolonged illness. Recognized as one of the key architects of Uganda's post-1986 economic recovery, he played a pivotal role in promoting deregulation and privatization to revitalize the economy following years of political and economic challenges.

During his final two years, Muhakanizi served as the Permanent Secretary at the Office of the Prime Minister (OPM), where he frequently took medical leave until his passing.

CHARLES ENGOLA SHOT

In a shocking incident in Kyanja, Minister of State for Labour, Employment & Industrial Relations, Rtd. Col. Charles Okello Engola was fatally shot by his bodyguard on 2nd May 2023, who later turned the gun on himself. The tragic event unfolded as Engola left his home for work. At the time of his death, Engola was the Member of Parliament representing the people of Oyam South in the Oyam district.






THE DEATH OF HONORABLE KATO LUBWAMA

In January, 2023, the police announced the closure of a section of Freedom City Mall after a stampede resulted in nine casualties, as revealed by Luke Owoyesigyire, Kampala Metropolitan Deputy Police Spokesperson. The incident unfolded during the New Year's fireworks display, where attendees were encouraged by the MC to go outside and witness the spectacle at midnight.

According to the Kampala Metropolitan Deputy Police Spokesperson, Luke Owoyesigyire, said the victims were crushed as hundreds of people tried to return to the hall after watching a fireworks display that ushered in the New Year.

Nine individuals lost their lives instantly, with several others sustaining injuries. As we usher in 2024, let this serve as a reminder to exercise caution and prioritize safety.

The incident sparked discussions about the roles of key players in ensuring safety during such events leading to the arrest of the event organiser Abitex. Abitex also known Abbey

Musinguzi, was accused of negligence which allegedly resulted in the death of eleven people. However, the Makindye Chief Magistrates court dismissed the 13 charges against him and his co accused Elvis Francis Juuko, on October 5, 2023.



It has been a spectacular year for Ugandan athletics, the nation has once again asserted its dominance on the global stage, showcasing exceptional performances in various international competitions.

Uganda hosted the East African School Games in August 2023, promoting regional cooperation and highlighting the outstanding talent of young athletes from the East African community.

In the 2023 World Athletics Championships

(Hungarian: 2023the nineteenth edition of the World Athletics Championships, which were held from 19 to 27 August 2023 at the National Athletics Centre, in Budapest, Hungary, Uganda sent a 21-member team that displayed remarkable skill and determination. Joshua Cheptegei secured a gold medal in the 10,000m race and Oscar Chelimo got a bronze in the 5,000m race.

In September, 2023, at the Diamond League Halimah Nakaayi's finished in the fifth place in the 800m race which further solidifies Uganda's standing in the world athletics.

Despite not securing medals at the Commonwealth Games in Birmingham, Ugandan athletes exhibited exemplary performances, demonstrating the depth of talent Uganda has.

GOVERNMENT HALTS TIMBER EXPORTS IN RESPONSE TO PRESIDENTIAL DIRECTIVE ON DEFORESTATION

he Ugandan government, in collaboration with the Ministry of Trade, National Forestry Authority, Customs, Police, and sister security agencies, initiated the enforcement of a presidential directive aimed at curbing deforestation. This directive entailed a ban on the production of charcoal and the sale of timber outside the country.

The immediate consequence of this directive has been the suspension of timber exports from Uganda to international markets. The ban, announced in July 2023 during a security press briefing, is being actively implemented through joint operations involving the police, sister security forces, and forestry authorities, in coordination with local governments.

"We want to inform the public that the police have commenced joint operations to enforce the presidential directive on the ban of timber and commercial charcoal production in the country," stated spokesperson Fred Enanga. The genesis of this initiative can be traced

back to an executive order issued by President Museveni on May 24. The order banned charcoal burning and illegal timber production, emphasizing the need to address environmental damage caused by undisciplined individuals. Various agencies were directed to take immediate action.

According to the police, the ban applies to all timber traders, transporters, middlemen, and locals involved in facilitating the illegal transportation of timber. It is now deemed illegal to export timber out of the country. Rigorous monitoring, covering land, air, and water transport, is in place. Intelligence operations are actively targeting unscrupulous dealers, criminal elites, and politicians attempting to subvert the presidential directive.

This ban is especially timely given the alarming reports of increased deforestation in Uganda. Forests are being cleared for agriculture, urbanization, and logging for charcoal and other business purposes.

Experts warn that without government intervention to curb deforestation, the country's National Environment Management Authority predicts the loss of all forests within 25 years. Studies indicate that almost all forests outside protected areas have already been cleared.

These measures mark an essential step towards sustainable forestry management and combating deforestation.

































A RISING DRUMBEAT OF CLIMATE CHAOS


In 2022, the world witnessed a barrage of extreme weather events, including recordbreaking heatwaves, floods in Pakistan, and famine threatening 150 million Africans due to a severe drought. Despite these alarming signs, greenhouse gas emissions increased instead of decreasing by nearly half, as required to limit global warming to 1.5°C above pre-industrial levels. As 2023 unfolded, the prospects for breaking temperature records again remained high, and the likelihood of reducing emissions appeared slim.

United Nations Climate Change Conference which took place in Dubai, United Arab Emirates, from 30 November until 12

December 2023, addressed the challenging issue of setting up a "loss and damage" fund for countries affected by climate disasters. While there are glimmers of hope, such as Brazil's commitment to combat deforestation and Australia's prioritization of climate issues, the urgency for global action is paramount. Positive developments include significant renewable energy investments in the United States and the European Union's introduction of green tariffs to penalize high-carbon imports. However, for substantial progress, China, the largest emitter, must accelerate its shift away from coal. Meanwhile, Russia, the fourth-largest emitter, showed little inclination to address methane emissions from its oil and gas production. As fossil fuel prices rise, there is a growing global incentive to embrace renewables and reduce energy waste, but the overarching concern remains the continued environmental toll of fossil fuel reliance.

DIGITAL NUMBER PLATES LAUNCHED BY MINISTRY OF WORKS AND TRANSPORT

he Ministry of Works and Transport launched the digital number plates which are to help curb insecurity in Uganda.

The new vehicles will pay 714,000 Ugx and the old ones will pay 150,000 Ugx and motorcycles will pay 50,000 Ugx.

The announcement by the Ministry of Works sparked off conversation in the public about the intended fees that many termed as too exorbitant.

The Ministry continues to assure the public that the primary reason for the introduction of digital number plates is to curb insecurity as they have features that make it easier to track and monitor vehicles contributing to the prevention of crimes like car theft and unauthorized use of vehicles.

On May 26th, 2023, Presidents Yoweri Kaguta Museveni and Samia Suluhu Hassan commissioned the integration of the Ugandan

and Tanzanian ICT backbone infrastructure in Isingiro District. This achievement brings the two nations closer together in their pursuit of reliable and high-speed internet connectivity, which plays a pivotal role in driving socio-economic development and fostering innovation.

On August 1st, 2023, the National Information Technology Authority Uganda (NITA-U) announced a further reduction in the price of internet bandwidth for Government Ministries, Departments and Agencies (MDAs) from \$70 to \$35 per Mbps through the National Backbone Infrastructure (NBI). This price reduction means government offices connected to the NBI will consume the internet at the lowest price in the market.

Tanzania and Uganda signed a memorandum of understanding (MoU) to integrate their national information and communication technology (ICT) networks. The 15-year agreement will connect Tanzania's National ICT Broadband Backbone (NICTBB) with Uganda's National Backbone Infrastructure (NBI) through collaboration between Tanzania's TTCL Corporation and Uganda's National IT Authority (NITA-U).


